I was so proud to be able to teach a student body with so much ambition and drive. It truly was one of the highlights of virtual teaching for me." The project even took aim at prominent needs within our community brought on by the global pandemic, he explained, "I had a student whose project was based on helping elderly people get groceries. That was a direct response to the pandemic. And at the end of the day, what life is all about: what can any of us do to make our world a little better?"

Let me remind you that this project is not limited to the sophomores in Mr. Hughes English class and that anyone, anywhere can take on their own version of a passion project. In the words of Mr. Hughes, "I think perhaps the most important aspect of the Passion Project was the opportunity it gave students to figure out what they are passionate about and then figuring out how they can use those passions to benefit others. When we talk about cultivating happiness in life, I do think that the sense of satisfaction that comes from what we do for others is really an ingredient to a fulfilling life."
